To paraphrase the familiar saying, "Every coin tells a story." Perhaps not literally true, but certainly many coins do. This month, in lieu of a regular speaker, we'll engage in an extended sharing session, focused on **your** numismatic items and the story **you** can tell about them.

Pick one, or two, or maybe three of your most interesting specimens, and come share your story about them. Your story can cover many aspects of each item, including, for example:

- How you acquired it
- Its provenance
- Why it's special to you
- Under what circumstances would you get rid of it

In the spirit of tall tales, you can also create a fictional story about your item. So pick out your famous (or notorious) coins, and plan to share them on **Wednesday, March 27**. So that everyone may participate, please take pictures of your exhibits to facilitate viewing on Zoom.



FEBRUARY MEETING RECAP

Speaker **John Duff** grew up in El Centro, CA, close to Mexicali. He wrote an article about the ABW Clubs of Mexicali and Tijuana and of a token which came out two years before the ABW syndicate stopped at the end of Prohibition.

He began with Carl L. "Carlie" Wittington, the "King of Vice of Bakersfield". Around the turn of the 20th century, he had a saloon/bordello "The Owl" in Bakersfield. With the California Temperance movement approaching, a 1912 anti-prostitution law was to come first. Carlie saw the light (so to speak) and he formed a syndicate with Marvin Allen, Frank "Booze" Beyer: the AB&W Syndicate. A 1911 meeting in Mexicali with Esteban Cantú, later a governor of Baja California, set up a lucrative deal to control red light districts of Mexicali and Tijuana. The deal provided Cantú with funding for infrastructure, while The ABW Club (aka The Owl) became a large, organized syndicate eventually run by four "Border Barons" who ran different specific aspects of the business: gambling, prostitution, liquor. John showed photos and various items from The Owl (El Tecolate), including gambling chips, a menu, match book, and of course the token with the image of an owl.

John discussed the expansion of the business into Agua Caliente and the racetrack in Tijuana. The Agua Caliente area became the "Mexican Riviera" and was visited by many famous people.

John also presented new information from the granddaughter of Esteban Cantú. There was an Owl Café in El Centro that he finally connected to the business- though it closed in 2010. He showed photos connecting El Centro to the Mexican border town- the business had ties to both sides of the border.
