Ludwig Gies: Munich Period Cast Art Medals

Henry Scott Goodman

This was a new, improved version of Henry's May 2025 presentation of his "Caldera Collection" of Ludwig Gies medals from the Munich Years 1910-1917. Gies's education is poorly documented, though there was some known training in the arts. Gies was unfit for the army during World War I and worked in a munitions factory instead. In his works of this period, he distanced himself from patriotism and tended

to show the suffering of war. In all he produced 150 medals, of which 60 are in the Caldera Collection—and all of the Collection's medals were shown. Gies was also known for his sculptures.

This was a slide show with high resolution images set on a black background, followed by notation on their subject matter/title and known populations (from one to nine known examples of each). The slide show was set to soft background music, with no spoken words. Afterward there were several questions and a discussion of his work. This presentation was recorded and will be available on the Society's YouTube page.

Member Exhibits

- Bill talked about his Allen Houser medal. Houser was the first Apache born in captivity, and the first Native American to be named American Artist of the Year. His father fought along side Geronimo.
- Michael W was recently in Europe on a "NumismaTour". He felt the Madrid Mint was the best numismatic site on the trip and talked about four items: 1- A renaissance medal featuring Isotta, a mistress of Sigismondo Malatesta. 2- Naturally he had a 1446 medal of Malatesta as well. 3- a modern Garona medal from the Madrid mint. 4- another modern medal featuring a capra (goat)
- Mike M went to the 13th Annual American/Mexican Numismatic Convention in Scottsdale and made off with an impressive haul of coins (all shown in one photo), including ~twenty 8-reale pieces.
- Charlie L showed his 2016 Susan Taylor medal "Remembrance", recalling the World War I Battle of Ypres.

The general meeting adjourned at 9:07 PM. The next meeting will be on November 19, 2025.
